

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year fellow Lions,

We have come to the halfway point of the Lion year. I have had a great time visiting several clubs this year and look forward to getting to the remainder of the clubs in the second half of the year.

As Lions we are so blessed to be able to serve. During this season of giving, please consider donating to Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF), as many throughout the world are in need of assistance. LCIF provides funding to many communities and individuals globally through a variety of grants. Remember if any of your projects fall in line with the LCIF focal areas, they may be eligible for these grants. Last Lion's year LCIF distributed more than \$36 million in grants.

LCIF has expanded to eight focal points, but one of our oldest focal points is vision. LCIF grants have been critical in helping to reduce global blindness by funding projects that deliver eye care services, build and strengthen eye care facilities, train professionals, and increase awareness about eye health in under served communities.

Focusing on the youth is a critical step for the future of Lions. We need to involve them in our club activities so they feel part of the Lions organization and will want to help serve as they become young adults. In the spirit of "empowering greater good," as IP Dr. Patti Hill called Lions to perform, LCIF is collaborating with the nation's leading nonprofit organizations for the Choose Kindness project to help reduce bullying. LCIF is also helping youth with the Lions Quest program to enhance skills like problem-solving, decision-making, critical thinking, working in a team environment, and more.

Another long-standing focal point for LCIF is Disaster Relief. LCIF provides many grants that help respond to disasters and also help communities prepare for future disasters. Most of us remember the spring of 2019 when significant parts of the state were flooded, or the many wildfires that burned across Nebraska in 2012 and 2022. Nebraska benefited from multiple grants during those disasters, and we all appreciated the assistance. Think how much these grants mean to other people across the world feel when the unexpected happens in their community.

The Humanitarian focus has many branches. These branches include projects such as partnering with Gavi to procure over 110 million measles or measles/rubella vaccines for underdeveloped countries, projects that impact the lives of youth in developing countries including the construction schools, orphanages, and centers for street children, projects that help to provide clean water and sanitation installations in developing countries and much more.

Focusing on diabetes helps to combat vision complications that arise from the disease. Diabetes camps also help children to learn how to live with diabetes and that being diagnosed with diabetes does not mean that your life cannot have "sweet" moments.

The Environmental focus is as I have mentioned near and dear to me, and LCIF grants can raise environmental awareness, assist with environmental cleanup and restoration, and more.

Many clubs address hunger by helping local food banks, but LCIF can help on a much larger scale and in areas where there are no clubs to directly assist food banks, school-based feeding programs (where the only food children may get is at schools), and food centers in parts of the world where the struggle for food is never ending.

Lastly childhood cancer is a truly tragic situation. LCIF assists both individuals and medical centers to fight this disease, and LCIF grants empower Lions to improve the quality of life for children receiving treatment. Additionally, matching grants help to provide equipment and fund construction for large-scale projects that address unmet needs.

I feel so blessed to be part of this grrrreat organization and to be collaborating with such great Lions!

I look forward to seeing everyone at club visits and the Mid-Winter Convention in Broken Bow.

Also, don't forget the Nebraska Lions Foundation. We have several clubs using the Individual Assistance Matching Fund from the NLF. Since I brought up the Individual assistance, I want to thank all the clubs that sell our Raffle Tickets that fund our District Individual Assistance Fund, which last year paid out around \$7500. Also, Thank You to the clubs that donated prizes, so all money from the ticket sales goes to matching funds needed to help clubs to help people. 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

Greetings to all MD38 Lions! It is estimated that only about 60% of the service projects completed are actually reported. I am pleased that 13 District 38-O clubs have reported service projects within the last 6 months. Fremont, Laurel, Norfolk, Omaha Sunrise, Omaha Westside, Pierce, Tekamah, and Wahoo for reporting your service projects! Now, one of the most commonly asked questions I get is "why is reporting service projects so important"? The easy response is that the more service we can report provides greater opportunities for additional grants and financial donations that help Lions serve others.

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

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COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS MEETING MINUTES - NOVEMBER 5, 2023

The Council of Governor's meeting was called to order by CC Merlin Olson on Nov. 5, 2023 in Grand Island, Ne. Those in attendance were CC Merlin Olson, VCC Dave Emry, treasurer Randy Luthy, DG38-L Nick Dobesh, DG38-I Mike Geiger, DG 38-O Dave Melick, DG 38-N Evelyn Springer and Sec Ellen Olson, also in attendance were VDG Leon Sweigard, VDG Jason Reineke, 2VDG 38-O Karen Jackson and 2VDG 38-N Ralph Parrish, PID Randy Heitmann, PCC David Wentworth, PID Pat Vannette, PCC Wayne Hinerman, John Braisted, PDG Ed Dunn, and Marlyn Chilvers.

The secretary report for meeting held Aug 5 in Omaha. Corrections had been previously made but will now include a change of spelling of Ogallala. Motion was made by Dave Melick and seconded by Evelyn to accept the minutes as corrected.

The treasurer's report was read and explained by treasurer Randy Luthy.

PID Randy Heitmann explained the nomination process for international offices. Upon his recommendation the C of G voted to endorse PID Manoj Shah of Kenja, Africa for International Vice President.

Sec. Ellen Olson read reports sent to her by DG Dave Melick, DG Mike Geiger and Evelyn Springer. DG Nick verbally gave his report but will send the report to be filed.

2VDG Leon thanked PDG Allen Darell and PDG Wayne Hinerman for all they did to arrange the screening of over 400 sophomores at Grand Island High school. He feels they have built a trust with GI schools with the success of the screenings.

2VDG Ralph Parrish explained his goal to become digitally educated before his year as governor. He also stated his feelings we must communicate with young people on their level to get them involved in Lions. 2VDG Karen Jackson reported she is trying to reach down and get immersed in clubs to find potential zone chairman and other leaders hoping to build a team for her district. She also reported PDG Mavis Hall and Jason had visited the district 4 times in the district. Karen created ZOOM meetings to build confidence in future leaders a very rewarding activity to help move forward. She hopes to encourage past presidents to enter the zoom program.

1VDG Jason reported he had visited all four districts.

Their goals will be to increase membership and find leadership.

New business

PDG Wayne Hinerman reported from PDGs meeting concerning Fall Rally. It was decided the rally should continue to be held as it builds a relationship between members, and it motivates programs. The PDGs are responsible for planning the rally and supporting it financially. The PDGs only income is through donations, therefore they hope to be as close to possible to break even statice. Overage would go back to MD38. Rooms and food costs can be volatile; therefore, it is important to watch expenses closely. Most hotel will only sign a one-year contract. This year will be close to break even. The PDGs need cooperation of COGs to make it work. More discussion will be held at next COG meeting. District Administrator Marilyn Chilvers questioned why LCI is requesting date of births for members. PID Pat said LCI is plotting the dynamics of members. There is a plan being formalized for each club to have an e-mail that can be accessed by club presidents and vice presidents, secretaries would have their own. Nebraska Lions Foundation – Meeting Minutes November 3, 2023 Hastings, Nebraska

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Jeanne Gentry at 3:30 pm. Gentry led the Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation.

The roll call was taken by Secretary Lausterer showing 18 voting lions present and 6 absent. Voting members reported on club visits which they attended. There were 61 Lions in attendance.

Minutes: The July 22nd meeting minutes were reviewed and approved as published in the E edition of the Nebraska Lion Newspaper.

Treasurer Report: Lion Donna Darell provided treasurer reports which included a peach sales report by PDG Luthy showing sales revenue of \$760,040, sales expenses of \$592,823, freight expenses of \$91,783, for a net profit to the foundation of \$75,440. After reviewing reports submitted by Treasurer Donna, a motion was made by PCC Darell, seconded by Lion Neville, to accept the reports as presented. Motion carried.

Committee Reports

Assistance: Five members and two guests in attendance. Six requests were approved to three clubs for a total of \$3,950.

Camp: Six members in attendance. Seven youth attended Camp Floyd Rogers and clubs were reimbursed 50 % of the costs of \$550 per child. Registration for next summer's camp opens February 1st and the camp is the last week of June. The committee is exploring options for a diabetic day camp and donated \$500 to Camp CoHoLo.

Disaster Trailer: Four members present. Lion Wilma is available to come out to clubs or zones to speak. Note: Lion Wilma did a presentation on Saturday, November 4th, to all Lions in attendance at the Fall Rally.

Financial Investment: Seven members in attendance. The committee adjusted the mix of assets. Committee requested to move excess funds in First National checking account to an interest-bearing account. After discussion, a motion was made by PDG Hinerman, seconded by PCC Ritterbush, to approve of this action. Motion carried.

Focus On Health: Six members in attendance. Two initiatives to support childhood cancer were 1) a food drive to support Omaha Children's Hospital Carolyn Scott Rainbow House; and 2) support to the February 2024 Team Jack Foundation's gala event.

Hearing: Two members present. A quarterly Hearing Aid Bank report was reviewed and summarized. Seven over the ear and four in the ear hearing aids were received as donations.

MSU: Eight members present. New cameras will need to be purchased in the near future and cost approximately 82 thousand dollars. The cameras will be purchased over three-year periods for the next several years. In addition, the MSU # 2 van will need to be replaced in two years. Thus far, 18,425 students have been screened with a projection of 42 thousand by the end of the year.

Opening Eyes: Five members present. We have been in contact with the Nebraska Special Olympics but have not heard back on the date for next year's event. We anticipate it will be held on May 17th.

Public Relations: No committee reports.

Resource Development: Peach and pear sales brought in \$75,440. Plans are underway for the horse racing again at the State Convention.

Sight: Five members and three guests present. Plan to do an article for the E edition Newsletter. Another request for assistance with vision therapy will be forthcoming. Kid Sight Host Clubs need to make sure the cameras are routinely charged, and printers have necessary supplies, e.g., extra print cartridges.

Youth Programs: Three members and one guest present. Planning for Youth Leadership Camp again as well as the All-Star Golf Tournament, which is scheduled for June 24-25, 2024, in Kearney.

Youth Disaster: One member present. Distribution of backpacks to clubs and service organizations is on-going. We also need to continue to collect items for the backpacks.

OLD BUSINESS

PDG Ed noted that clubs need to up-date member e-mail addresses on 'MyLCI'.

Chairperson Jeanne noted that we received an individual donation of \$1,000 today from Lion Bolln and DG Dave Melick spoke about how a donation was made from some children who would be moving to Saudi Arabia from Texas and when they heard about our Lions organization, they emptied their piggy banks for the NLF!!

Chairperson Jeanne emphasized how important it is to have "passion" for your committee and if you want to change to another committee think about it prior to the next NLF meeting in April of 2024. Jeanne also suggested committees think about combining their committee work with another committee "if" they share similar goals or outcomes. A summary of each committee is on the MD 38 webpage for reference. There was a discussion about our pop-up banners. We need to ensure that each district has up-to-date pop-up banners for use with relevant information.

Chairperson Jeanne thanked everyone for their thoughts, prayers and well wishes during her recent health concerns. They were very much appreciated!

November 2023 Report of the Nebraska Lions Foundation Mobile Screening Unit

The Lions Club of Nebraska continue to impress with their community service to the public and private schools in their communities. Even with a few days off the calendar for a needed Thanksgiving break, the Mobile Screening Units screened 6,049 students along with 11 adults.

697 student vision (11.5%) and 394 hearing referrals (11.3%) were created. They were referred to either the school nurse in-charge of the screenings or to the appropriate school administrators.

The process and procedures used by the Nebraska Lions Foundation Mobile Screening Units follow the screening regulations set by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Service, School Health Division, known as Title 173 Chapter 7. Our role is always to assist the school nurse, administrators and local school boards in complying with these school health screening requirements.

After three and a half months of screenings the NLF MSU's have reached the halfway point of the screening year. The two MSU's have been at 137 schools in 83 communities, over 99 screening date, for two routes, and have utilized 576 Lions and community volunteers. 23,318 students and 91 adults have been screened, with 2,595 vision (11.1%) and 1,824 hearing (11.4%) referrals.

A grand opportunity was presented to the Lions of Nebraska on Friday, November 3rd. Arranged by Past District Governor (PDG) Wayne Hinerman, the two Mobile Screening Units, with all six Spot Vision Screeners screened the Sophomore class at Grand Island High School. This was a vision only screening for the Lions. In

just 2 hours and 30 minutes 381 students were screened, with 81 vision referrals (21.2%.).

This month the entire Mobile Screening Unit staff, Allen Darell, Steve Steward, Leon Sweigard, Roxanne Chandler and Keith Burge served at some point. The NLF MSU also introduced another resource for future screenings, Lion Dick Sheets of Norfolk. Lion Dick has been out on a couple of screening appointments with Lion Leon. We will be developing him into a part-time/backup resource. With these DOM's (Driver-Operator-Managers) NLF MSU will finally have adequate coverage that's been needed for several years. This year with 274 schools, a lot of travel, it's a bit daunting for just one or two Lions to perform. In the 2024-25 school year, with the amount of inquiries received so far, the MSU's could be screening in 300 schools.


For nearly seven years Lions clubs and their schools have been served by PCC Allen Darell. Lion Allen is looking at surgery on his right wrist in January or February, to repair if possible, some wrist bones and cartilage that have been severely damaged or obliterated in a fall this past August, slipping in a monsoon rainstorm. So having capable backup DOM's is critical to continuing the operations of the NLF MSU Program.
