Greeting fellow Lions,

I hope you are all staying safe and warm this winter.

As we are past halfway through the Lion's year, it is time to start thinking about the future leadership with our club officers for next year already. I would like to encourage my fellow Lions to consider stepping up into officer positions that they may not have been in before. I would also like to encourage clubs to not reuse members in the same position for multiple years in a row, with the potential exception of club secretary and treasurer.

If you are wanting to step up to a club officer position but aren't sure what a position entails and are afraid you can't do it, I would like to encourage and tell you, that you can. There are many sources to turn to and learn what any officer's duties are.

The first and easiest source is your own fellow club members who have filled the position previously. By talking with a previous club president, secretary, treasurer, or whichever position, you will be able to learn local traditions especially with the Lion Tamer and Tail Twister. If you are new to Lions, I would strongly encourage you to consider these last two positions as they are great positions to start as a club officer. Tail Twisters can be a lot of fun especially if you have a creative personality.

The next source for information about officer duties is Lions University. It can be found at https://lionsuniversity.org/. The bachelor's program covers many of the local club officer duties, with a webinar, including club president (good for the VP and 2nd VP), secretary, treasurer, and tail twister positions. The training courses are roughly 1 hour each and in addition to officer training it also offers trainings for effective meetings, growing membership, conflict resolution, and more. Also, with Lions University if you complete the required training and then attend a USA/Canada Forum, you can ascertain you Bachelor's at the first forum you attend. As I said back after this year's forum, they are also great learning opportunities.

The next source of training is at the district and multiple district levels, although this requires a little more planning. At the district level, we have the Global Leadership Team, for District L, PDG Ed Dunn is our GLT. If you would like training from PDG Ed, consider working with surrounding clubs, potentially your zone and region, and contact him to schedule a time for training. This would also be a great position to contact at the start of next Lion year. At the multiple district level, any of the conventions (Fall Rally, Mid-winter, or State) are excellent sources of leadership. A large percentage of the attendees of these events have been in many of the local club positions, and the added benefit of talking with officers from other clubs is the opportunity to learn other possible ideas to bring back to your local club.

As we are thinking of our club level officers, I would also like to ask you to consider District level positions. This Lions year I have been operating with only about half of my district cabinet filled. As with the club officers, there are trainings for district officer to help someone prepare for the positions. The first is again Lions University. Like their bachelor's degree, there is a Master's program that specifically covers district level positions and topics. I myself have done both the Bachelor's and master's program and both were very helpful for me.

Secondly a very helpful training course for Lions looking to step up into leadership is the Great Plains Lions Leadership Institute. This year the institute will be held July 26th-July 28th at the Northwest Missouri State University in Maryville, MO. The registration form is at https://www.iowalions.org/wp-content/uploads/2023/12/2024-GPLLI-Application.pdf. As the name implies, there are Lions from all over the Great Plains enabling an individual to learn not only what other clubs in our state do, but other state clubs do. There is a registration cost, but the district has some funds available to reimburse individuals. Again, this is an outstanding training, I attended back in 2016 and still talk to several of the other attendees and even some of the teachers from the institute.

Finally, I would like to encourage you one last time, to consider stepping up into a club or district officer position to help our clubs and district grow and enable us to grow our leadership. With greater depth in our leadership, Lions will be able to grow our GRRRRReat organization and expand our outstanding service to our communities.

Thank you and I look forward to seeing everyone at Mid-Winter in Broken Bow.

Winter Report of the Mobile Screening Unit Nebraska Lions Foundation, Inc.

The Lions year 2023-2024 for the NLF's Mobile Screening Unit has been busier than ever and has now supported by a team of Driver-Operator-Managers.

PCC Allen Darell leads team of six Lions who bring Vision, Hearing, Blood Pressure, Blood Sugar screenings to your communities. Currently, as of February 15, the MSU's are in the final 6 weeks of school screenings and are open to public and corporate (OSHA) screenings from mid-April to the end of July.

The Team

The NLF's Driver-Operators-Managers are Lion Leon Sweigard, 1st VDG, Norfolk; Lion Steve Steward, PDG, Unadilla; Lion Roxanne Chandler, Lincoln; Lion Dick Sheets, Norfolk; Lion Keith Burge, Tekamah and supported by Lion Allen Darell, Omaha as program support & training, and backup driver. George Witte remains the NLF MSU Committee Chairperson.

School Screening Update

As of February 15, 2024 the MSU's have screened 35,779 students and 294 adults in 210 schools in 124 cities, towns and villages around Nebraska. These screenings have found 4,019 abnormal vision and 2,852 abnormal hearing results. These results channel back to the school nurses and administrators who reach out to the student's parents.

32 school screening work dates remain which will screen in 45 to 50 schools, and approximately 5,750 students. So the NLF MSU school screenings will likely surpass 40,000-41,000 students screened again this year.

Lions clubs who would like to schedule a Mobile Screening Unit visit in their community should initiate a request online as follows:

School Screenings: Request period is open through March 15, 2024. Please go towww.md38.com website, locate the NLF or Nebraska Lions Foundation page and click the School Screen Request button.

Public / Corporate (OSHS) screenings follow the same process but click the Public Request button. Public screenings available between April 15 and July 31.

Remember, school screening requests you do not pick the dates. They are assigned by April 10. Public screenings can include a request date.

I do wish to thank all the Lions Clubs, their Lion and community volunteers for providing awesome support for us this year and for me this past seven years. Without your committed assistance and financial support the NLF MSU program would not be in existence today.

2021

The LCIF-Special Olympics partnership is celebrating 20 years of free vision screenings for athletes through the Opening Eyes program. Since partnering, more than 445,000 athletes have been screened and prescription eyewear provided to more than 189,000 athletes globally.

2022

Past International President Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada, Campaign 100 chairperson, and Past International President J. Frank Moore III, Campaign 100 vice chairperson, proudly announced during the 104th Lions Clubs International Convention that LCIF exceeded the Campaign 100: LCIF Empowering Service goal. Total funds raised during the campaign were US\$325 million.

Sight For Kids, a program co-founded by LCIF and Johnson & Johnson Vision, is celebrating 20 years of providing equitable access to vision care through comprehensive eye health solutions. Since the program began, more than 42 million children have been screened and more than 600,000 provided eyeglasses or other treatment.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine resulted in a humanitarian crisis which LCIF supports through grants to purchase and distribute immediate relief items, such as food, clothing, hygiene supplies, sleeping bags and medicine. LCIF mobilizes more than US \$4.8 million for Ukraine relief. LCIF additionally mobilized its Refugees and Displaced Persons fund, which helps ensure that Lions are there to help refugees find the safety and security they desperately need now, and in the future.

2023

LCIF and Lions Quest are proud to be a founding member of The Choose Kindness Project, a coalition of the leading nonprofit organizations in the United States championing bullying prevention, intentional inclusion and youth mental wellness.

The World Health Organization validated Benin and Mali as having eliminated trachoma, a bacterial eye infection that causes blindness, as a public health problem. The milestone follows many years of hard work led by national governments in each country, with support from international partners, including LCIF's SightFirst partnership with The Carter Center.
